

# LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Each year, there are milestones to be celebrated and challenges to be acknowledged and learned from. The PSO's 2024-2025 season is no exception.

This season's Main Stage programs—musically demanding, rewarding, and emotionally charged—hit a new highwater mark thanks to the creativity of Music Director John Page and the hard work and dedication on the part of our talented musicians.

Financially, we are especially encouraged by the generosity of our individual supporters, most notably former PSO Board President Dr. Clinton Frederick Miller II and his wife Laurel whose sizable gift established a new Guest Artist Fund. We are also proud to have surpassed both our \$25,000 Annual Appeal goal (raising over \$27,000) and our \$6,000 NH Gives goal (raising just over \$7,000). Foundation support proved critical this year in helping us to meet our goal of expanded educational offerings. In particular, the Fuller Foundation and the Rosamond Thaxter Foundation supported the return of the Explore + Learn school day performance at The Music Hall, and Bangor Savings Bank Foundation helped to underwrite the cost of our small ensemble school outreach concerts.

The PSO supports and celebrates the work of smaller ensembles, like the Principal Winds and the Portsmouth Brass Quintet, who play a vital role in achieving our mission to make classical music more widely accessible to musicians and audiences of today and tomorrow. Furthermore, it was with great pride that we received the news that the Principal Winds had been recognized in June 2025 by the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts for their professional caliber and commitment to music education.

Our business partners continue to play a critical role in making our Main Stage series affordable and we are grateful to those who renewed their support of the PSO this season, or who joined us for the first time. As the cost of performing high quality classical music on the Seacoast continues to increase, investment from our sponsors is vital.

Audience numbers this year continue to be strong, although did dip slightly below last year's post-pandemic rebound, presenting an opportunity for us to refine our engagement strategies for the coming season.

What makes the PSO so special, both musically and as an organization, is the people who devote countless hours and contribute decades of experience to achieving our mission. We were saddened by the loss of PSO board member Lawrence Connell, to whom we are grateful for his service.

As we look back at all that has transpired over the past season, we do so with pride at what we have accomplished and with appreciation for all those who made these successes possible.



# 2024-2025 NEWS



The PSO Principal Winds was added to the NH State Council on the Arts, Arts Education Roster, a recognition of the group's professional caliber and commitment to musical education. These individuals and groups bring unique real-world knowledge and perspectives into the classroom and play a crucial role in the process of arts learning and developing creative thinking.

The Portsmouth Symphony Orchestra is saddened by the recent passing of board member Lawrence Connell, who died on June 3, 2025 after a long illness. He was 88 and resided in Rye Beach, NH. Lawrence was a financial regulator, banker, former Chairman of the National Credit Union Administration, U.S. Treasury Department senior advisor and consultant and a life-long lover the of the arts. He will be missed.



# PERFORMING GUEST ARTISTS FUND



The Portsmouth Symphony Orchestra was the recipient of a generous \$300,000 donation from local philanthropist and former PSO Board President Clinton Frederick Miller II, MD and his wife Laurel Ann Miller. This endowment establishes the PSO's new Guest Performing Artists Fund, interest from which will be used annually to help cover professional fees of top-tier artists to perform as guest soloists with the PSO at The Music Hall.

The PSO is honored to be the beneficiary of Rick and Laurel's incredible generosity. "As a pianist and retired neurosurgeon, Rick has always shared his passion for classical music and infused his commitment to excellence in all of his endeavors on behalf of the PSO, including being guest soloist with the orchestra for Edvard Grieg's Piano Concerto in March 2018" reflected David Young, current PSO Board President. "The power of this gift is immense and will further enhance our ability to bring the highest quality symphonic music to the Seacoast."

Dr. Miller served as a member and President of the PSO board of directors for ten years. During his time on the board, the PSO grew its budget to be able to better attract and retain a mixed complexion of accomplished amateurs, part-time professionals and full-time professional musicians and developed several innovative partnerships with other organizations and musical groups.

"It is nothing short of miraculous that the comparatively small population of Southern New Hampshire and the Seacoast has, for 27 years, produced the wide variety of accomplished and dedicated amateur, semi-professional, and professional musicians who make up this first-class symphony orchestra. Under the charismatic leadership of Maestro John Page, the PSO has helped to create a vibrant arts scene, making the NH Seacoast a destination that rivals any major city," said Dr. Miller. "Attracting top-tier guest musicians to Portsmouth to perform alongside our talented orchestra is the next frontier for the PSO and Seacoast region. Laurel and I, along with our children, are grateful to be in a position to help underwrite this effort, and encourage others to contribute to this fund. We hope this will be a dream come true for Maestro Page, the orchestra members and all lovers of symphonic music in Southern New Hampshire and the Seacoast."

The first concert supported by this new endowment will take place on Saturday, September 20, 2025, featuring renowned violinist Itzhak Perlman.

# A WORD FROM JOHN PAGE, MUSIC DIRECTOR

The 2025-2026 season promises to be one to remember, beginning in September with a special event with The Music Hall featuring legendary violinist Itzhak Perlman.

Our October Main Stage concert, featuring two Austrian composers who were both considered masters of harmony, will be performed for the first time in two locations—in Portsmouth, NH and in York, ME. We'll return again to both these stages in December for two afternoon performances of our Family Holiday Pops! concerts.

In March, local pianist Mike Effenberger will be joining us for a performance of Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue." The program also features Florence Price's *Symphony No. 1* and Jessie Montgomery's *Starburst for String Orchestra*. These historically marginalized composers bring long-overdue representation and cultural relevance to the classical concert stage, creating opportunities for audiences of all backgrounds to see themselves reflected in our programs.

And then finally, bringing the Main Stage season to a fittingly dramatic conclusion in June, are two works by Beethoven and Tchaikovsky that embrace the spectrum of human experience. This will also be our chance to celebrate the talented winner of the 2026 Young Artist competition.

As you plan your time with us this season, I encourage you to join me in The Music Hall for the Inside the Music pre-performance talks, which are meant to heighten the experience and make the musical program more accessible for both life-long and new classical music lovers.

Our work to entertain, educate, and encourage the musicians and audiences of today and tomorrow will continue next season through our small ensemble performances at local schools, and with our Explore + Learn concert that is part of The Music Hall's School Day series.

In addition, you can find our chamber ensembles performing around the Seacoast and we will be partnering with the Portsmouth Public Library to host our Family Matinees series.

The Seacoast Community Chamber Orchestra began in 1997 as 40 local musicians coming together to play music and occasionally present concerts in area churches. Initially, it was supported financially solely by membership dues. From a few family and friends in a local church, the orchestra now known as the Portsmouth Symphony Orchestra is today a 65-piece orchestra comprised of local professional musicians, educators, and advanced community musicians reaching over 4,000 community members annually.

Under the direction of Maestro John Page, internationallyrenowned conductor, educator, and recording artist, the orchestra has matured, increasing substantially in size, sound and reach and in 2019 was designated the resident orchestra of The Music Hall in Portsmouth.

Our performance season now includes three Main Stage performances annually at The Music Hall, each with a preconcert talk by the Maestro, two Family Holiday Pops! concerts at area high schools, two Family Matinees concerts a year, the PSO Chamber Players Series, the Explore + Learn School Day Series, in-school visits by PSO chamber ensembles throughout the year, and an annual Young Artist Competition held at Riverwoods the winner of which is highlighted in the June PSO concert.
